which, on its face, makes sense, but when you analyze it you see that it doesn't. That's not the fault of my friend in the Chair. I just like to sometimes call our attention to these things which are in and of the culture. Now Senator Matzke made an interesting statement in suggesting that more time ought to be given; you shouldn't put a deadline and make things happen too quickly. But yesterday he was not in favor of a moratorium that would prevent people from being killed too quickly. See, I listen to people and I know that they're going to come back, and usually in less than 24 hours, with a position of theirs that contradicted the one that they took on an issue that was of concern to me. But I would not punish people in a county because they sent a representative to the Legislature who doesn't think all positions through and consider the ramifications, nor would I punish the people in a county because they elect dumb officials. See, county officials out there are slow learners, Senator Dierks. It's not that they feel the state government breathing down their neck. They don't catch on quickly and they don't realize that a stampede is occurring until they're flat on their back and, when they look up, they see the bottom of the cattle's hooves. Then they say, something's going on here; I'll figure it out pretty soon. (Laugh) By the time they figure it out, all the cattle are gone and they say, well, I guess nothing's going on here. Well, right, it has gone already. So here is what we're faced with--a situation where people who may not be too smart will elect officials who are not too smart. But the people are trying to acknowledge that we need somebody in a position to look out for out interests better than we can look out for them ourselves, and maybe those people do turn out to be derelict in that regard, some because of slothfulness, some through lack of information and understanding, some just laziness or carelessness. But the fact is if there is a problem confronting people then the position of the state should be to help those people take care of that problem. And I, for one, am not in favor of Senator Kremer's amendment. I don't think we ought to move this date from June 1st to January 1st. Senator Stuhr and others have said quite correctly that if you give people time to just take their time to do something, they generally will take all of that time. But the contrary argument could be made and here I will quote a statement that is often given and it's based on what Senator Beutler first brought out--haste makes waste.
