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don't know how...how substantive they are. They are more...they are more technical workability provisions, functional provisions, than they are any policy provisions. Senator Bohlike couldn't be here at this time and I told her I'd be glad to try to present the amendment to you for your consideration. If there are any questions, her counsel or my counsel or I will try to respond to that. Thank you, Mr. Lieutenant Governor.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Thank you, Senator Bromm. (Visitors introduced.) Discussion on AM1147 to LB 704, Senator Redfield.

SENATOR REDFIELD: Thank you, Mr. Lieutenant Governor. I would ask Senator Bromm would yield to some questions.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Senator Bromm.

SENATOR BROMM: Yes, Senator Redfield.

SENATOR REDFIELD: It's been a long time since I turned 21, and so I have some questions. Is there some significant difference in the identification on a license when someone is 21-years-old as far as color as opposed to before they are 21 to ease retailers identification someone is 21?

SENATOR BROMM: Yes, Senator Redfield, there is a blue background before they're 21, and it gives the...now the expiration will be their 21st birthday. So that should make it easier for re...first of all, the red should get the retailer's attention, then the expiration date will be their 21st birthday so that will be helpful.

SENATOR REDFIELD: So the question I have, if we issue a license to someone 10 days before they turn 21 and we're giving them their state ID card, do we have a problem for retailers in identifying that, in fact, this person has not turned 21?

SENATOR BROMM: You could argue that. That's the way it's been. That's the way we've issued licenses up till this time, and that 10-day period is a period of question when they will have to...they will have to examine that license carefully but that's correct.
