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SENATOR REDFIELD: Double piping is currently going on and, actually, that is exactly what is trying to be addressed in this bill, is to prevent that continuing.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Well, what's going to happen where the double piping exists already? Are they going to pull those pipes out of the ground?

SENATOR REDFIELD: Probably not, unless we want to add that in here.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: So you would allow what you and Senator Bruning call a safety hazard to continue to exist where it exists now.

SENATOR REDFIELD: Actually, I would like to see that put in here.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: But you're not going to offer an amendment to do that, are you?

SENATOR REDFIELD: I haven't prepared one at this time, no.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: So then those people who are located where double piping is existing will be under that severe safety threat that you and Senator Bruning have informed us about. Is that true?

SENATOR REDFIELD: Unless we can get that in here, yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: So we're not concerned enough about the safety of those people to correct their situation, based on where you sit.

SENATOR REDFIELD: Actually, the municipalities that are involved have spoken in the hearing about this and they're very concerned about it and I think it's something we need to address. They came and testified on this bill because they wanted to see that it did not increase.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you, Senator Redfield. Senator Bruning, I'd like to ask you a question and, so I won't forget,
