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SENATOR BRUNING: (Laugh) We were both sitting down.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: But he sat on a highchair, huh? At any rate, your minds met and this, this amendment simply would allow one individual who has enough courage to come between these two battling behemoths and bring peace, if possible, or what?

SENATOR BRUNING: Or have their interests represented if they believed they had an interest that was contrary to both of the behemoths.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you. Now I'd like to ask Senator Redfield a question.

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: Senator Redfield, would you respond?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Redfield, in talking about rates, you talked about some preferential consideration given to commercial entities. Is that true?

SENATOR REDFIELD: That is true.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Well, why do we have to consider raising the residential rates rather than doing as I and others had attempted to do in the past, do away with the preferential treatment given to commercial entities? Would you be willing to do that?

SENATOR REDFIELD: Senator, I think everybody should pay at the same rate.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: So then you'd be willing to do away with the preferential rate or...

SENATOR REDFIELD: Yes, I would.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...or we would just say we have a unitary rate, then we don't have to...

SENATOR REDFIELD: Yes, I would.
