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SENATOR WICKERSHAM: Certainly.

SENATOR BROMM: Senator Wickersham, many of our towns or our schools have some sort of an occasional rental arrangement whereby they will lease out a meeting room or rooms, and they will actually recover some money to offset utilities, custodial costs. Normally, it's not a big amount but could you...could you please tell me how that fits into the scheme of this bill?

SENATOR WICKERSHAM: No, I don't think that...I'll give you my personal opinion, and obviously my personal opinion at this point is only that because, ultimately, the decisions about whether something is taxed will be made after the implementation of the bill, and after we see how local assessors, local county boards and, ultimately the courts, interpret the language. But I don't think that kind of incidental use would subject anything to taxation under the provisions of this bill. I mean, it's still clearly...

SENATOR BROMM: You...do you think that it would be appropriate to consider an incidental use clarification, or...I don't think it would be too difficult...

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: One minute.

SENATOR BROMM: ...to write, but incidental or occasional use...occasional, perhaps, is the word I'm looking for...to clarify that that shouldn't be looked upon as triggering an incidence of tax, or do you think that's unnecessary?

SENATOR WICKERSHAM: Well, I think that that is more comfort language and we've provided comfort language in a couple of other areas. I don't know that I would object to it but, Senator, I frankly don't know that it would add anything.

SENATOR BROMM: Okay. Thank you. I'm, again, supporting the Kristensen amendment and I understand what Senator Raikes is saying, and others, about following the wishes of the voters but I...

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Time.
