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that I had on General File, if you'll recall. What this amendment is is very little change from the original amendment, the original bill, except I've changed some dates. And so the heart of the matter is that I wanted to bring your attention today on Select File is I've delayed the time for this to be implemented. I recognize there are some questions out there as to how this is to work, and after looking at it, and specifically I'm trying to find a realistic fiscal note, I decided to wait and delay this until January 1st of 2001. As far as the implementation of getting tax credits, my intent would be, with this amendment which is very...very little change except the dates, and I do have a following floor amendment that will...another date that we failed to change that we should have. The intent would be that the committee would go into place of seven agriculture-related producers and so forth, the Tax Commissioner, State Director of Agriculture, and promulgate the rules and regulations and, most of all, ascertain through a survey or other means as to how much widespread use there would be of this bill. It's very difficult to write a reliable fiscal note specifically as to the use of it because the numbers are so hard to arrive at. I've got some figures out of North Dakota, which has a bill, by the way, that allows 100 percent of their income tax to be deducted; 100 percent of the income tax of the retiring farmer can deduct his income tax...100 percent of his income tax. Ours is 5 percent. So that in North Dakota, I haven't had a chance to really digest the figures but it's about, I had it right here, 500 hundred and...let's see, anyway, about 23 one year and I can't find the other one right off hand, but I don't think the use of this is going to be quite as large as our initial fiscal note indicated, which is around 5 to 7 million dollars. So one of the reasons that I want to delay this is to have a more accurate figure on this in another year. Next year at this time, hopefully prior to this time in the 60-day session, to have a more accurate fiscal note if you're interested in pursuing the policy. So, actually, today we're going to be talking about the policy, hopefully to encourage young farmers to get started in this state. I still believe the value of the bill is still there. We need to encourage some young people to get back on the farm. The most important thing we can do, I believe, is have them access to capital, and I know some of you have questioned whether we're doing enough for the young farmer versus perhaps this shows up as a benefit to the
