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if that be your desire.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Thank you, Senator Wehrbein. Further discussion on the Wickersham amendment to LB 630, Senator Bromm.

SENATOR BROMM: Thank you, Mr. Lieutenant Governor. I've been trying to follow this and, Senator Wickersham, I don't know if this requires an answer or not, but as I...what I've been able to glean so far is that Senator Wehrbein, who's the Chair of Appropriations, really would prefer not to do an appropriation and Senator Wickersham, as Chair of Revenue, would like to do a direct rebate. Is that what I'm hearing?

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Senator Wickersham.

SENATOR WICKERSHAM: In this instance, I'm willing to write a check. (Laughter)

SENATOR BROMM: I thought I was hearing that right and I just wanted to be sure. I wanted to hear it from your own lips. Thank you. No, I do have a couple of other questions. If I understand the amendment, Senator Wickersham, you're...you're suggesting that if we're going to do this arrangement, it would be on a cash rent basis as opposed to shares, and Senator Wehrbein's bill originally envisions crop shares and not cash rent. Is that...isn't that...is that accurate?

SENATOR WICKERSHAM: Yes, that's one difference.

SENATOR BROMM: Okay. If we were to go with crop shares, well, I should ask this of Senator Wehrbein, if he would yield to a question.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Senator Wehrbein, would you yield?

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Yes, I do.

SENATOR BROMM: Senator Wehrbein, if you've said this, please excuse me, but if we go with your...with your proposal, and it's crop shares, if there were a situation where they had cash rent, couldn't that easily be accommodated?
