SENATOR WEHRBEIN:      My intention is cash rent or crop share, either way.

SENATOR BROMM:      Either one. Is that...is that what the bill says now or does it strictly talk about share crop?

SENATOR WEHRBEIN:      I think it says cash or cr...I've got...I'll have to find it but I...

SENATOR BROMM:      Okay. Then, secondly, if it is share crop, to eliminate the problem, and Senator Wickersham I think has a valid point about when is this going to be sold, this owner's share, couldn't we...couldn't this board that's in place perhaps draw some guidelines for what is the prevailing cash rent in the area or the county and base the credit on those figures, rather than worrying about when they sell the crop? And wouldn't that be a workable thing? We do that in other tax areas.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN:      Yes, I would agree. Maybe...I used the example of cash when I first introduced the bill because it is acceptable to convert that. Sometimes, it's difficult. Some are used to dealing in crop share particularly for crops. On the livestock, it's, and the machinery, obviously, usually converted to cash but not always.

SENATOR BROMM:      And are you, necessarily, opposed to the beginning farmer sharing part of this credit, if that's necessary...

SENATOR WEHRBEIN:      Well,...

SENATOR BROMM:      ...or that's agreed upon or...

SENATOR WEHRBEIN:      ...yeah, because it's part of his whole amendment, there's several things in there I don't like, I was opposing the whole thing. I suppose you could pick out bits and pieces but I really believe that access to capital is the most critical thing a young farmer can have.

SENATOR BROMM:      Right, and I...and I tend to agree with that, and I...it's awfully hard to be against something like this, but I...but I continue to have questions and I'm guilty of not
