SENATOR CROSBY: One minute.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: ...the incentive to stay with it and to help someone else, and I think splitting that pot, first of all, the pot's going to be very small between the two. It hardly is enough incentive to work. And so I will have some real reservations if this amendment passes, frankly, and at least working in its present form. Perhaps it can be looked at, particularly the oversight. Once again, understand the appropriations side of it and I'd be willing to look at that. But I really don't feel comfortable at all splitting that between the two even with an agreement. Thank you. So I urge you not to support Senator Wickersham's amendment.

SENATOR CROSBY: Thank you, Senator Wehrbein. On the Wickersham amendment, Senator Price.

SENATOR PRICE: Senator Crosby and members of the body, I will give my time to Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CROSBY: Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Madam President, members of the Legislature, as a state senator, I look at things that are happening throughout the state. If I could tell Senator Wehrbein that all the hardworking people, whether they're on the farm or in the city, should be guaranteed success and it was within my power to do that, then I would reward them with success because virtue should be rewarded. I don't have that power, the Legislature lacks that power, and the world of reality simply does not operate that way. There are changes taking place which nobody can stop. A train on a track is going to go where the track takes it, and a person can be as angry against the train as he or she pleases but the train is not going to go off the track. This country is in the clutches of corporations. If that were not the case, no CEO would dare accept a salary of over \$100 million for a year. That shows contempt for people. It shows contempt for social justice. It shows contempt for the notion that you are paid what you earn. But they know that there's nobody who can and, in most cases, nobody who will attempt to resist them. The march of the corporate farm or
