If there were some way to make it clear that we realize that this bill's passage is not really going to do anything I would feel differently about it. Maybe say that this is the first step towards something else. I don't know what that "something else" is. Let me ask Senator Wehrbein a question.

SENATOR CROSBY: Senator Wehrbein, will you yield?

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Wehrbein, this is not to put you on the spot, so if you'd rather not answer I understand. How many farms at the end of three years do you think...

SENATOR CROSBY: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...may, as a result of this bill, have been purchased by a young person who otherwise would not have?

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Did you say forward, peering forward, is that right?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Yes.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Well, that's...I said...as I said when I started, it's difficult to get an A bill, a fiscal response, because we can't determine that. The fiscal note officially says 1,100 per year for three years. I think that, myself personally, is about four times too high. South Dako...North
