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Dakota had 23 in 1997 and 13 in 1996.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Who actually purchased.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Took advantage of it, not a purchase.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Oh.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Not a...this is not a purchase in any sense. It's a lease.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: I know, but I meant at the end of the three-year lease how many of these young people do you think...

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Oh, I don't have that...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...are going to make the purchase?

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: ...I don't have that info...you mean after the three-year how many you think would take.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Yes.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: I...I...I couldn't tell you, but I do think that a lot of it depends on the three-year period. If it's...we have a decent three-year period and the weather's right, I think there could be some opportunities to continue.

SENATOR CROSBY: Time.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you.

SENATOR CROSBY: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Senator Jensen.

SENATOR JENSEN: Thank you, Madam President, members of the body. I have not spoken on this issue since it originally came up and I do share some of Senator Chambers' comments and thoughts in that I really do hope that we are doing the right thing here. You know, I recall the movie a couple years ago that was popular called "Jerry Maguire", who was a sports agent and he was working on a particular individual trying to get him placed in pro football and the individual just kept coming back
