and saying, show me the money, show me the money. And what is interesting is where there is money there are always investors. And I do hope that we're doing the right thing by LB 630 in that I can recall, I believe it was in the sixties and seventies, when because of some tax incentives really from the federal government that we had investors, many of my peers, who got involved in agriculture and the reason they did was because there were tax advantages for them to do so. And they went out in western Nebraska and prayed...paid prices for property that was above really what it should have been, put in center pivots. The reason they did that is they could fully depreciate the cost of those center pivots and take it off of their other earned income and, thereby, further increase the value of that property. I hope by this that we are not artificially inflating the price of the farm property in Nebraska above over what it should be. Now maybe that's a stretch, I don't know, but I do know that...that where you provide a tax incentive many times it becomes an incentive to get into an investment that perhaps was not there without the incentive. And so, looking back at the history of farming, it really did the farmer no good. All it did was provide a tool for investors to write off. Now, this is not a write-off, but are we artificially inflating the price of that property in Nebraska over what it should be? There's no question about it. To invest in farming today from scratch is unbelievable and probably if you were to take an economics course and they would probably say if you've got that kind of money to invest maybe it'd be better to put it somewhere else other than farming. But certainly there are those who love farming and have a desire to be into that and I'm certainly all for them. But I do have some concern that...that we are in a position here that, because of incentives, that we might be inflating the price of property over what it really should be. And I do endorse Senator Wickersham's bill, because I...or amendment, because I think it does allow perhaps for that young farmer maybe to take advantage of it and there isn't any question, however, the young farmer doesn't need the tax incentive. The person who's selling does need it and can use it. So I don't know just really what I'm going to do on this bill. I want to do everything I can to help agriculture in the state of Nebraska,...
