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tests, there's the Metropolitan Achievement Test, and there's the Comprehensive Test...

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: One minute.

SENATOR BEUTLER: ...of Basic Skills, all of which measure more or fewer, depending on the test, but none of them measure all of the standards that we're interested in. Is that not...is that not accurate, Senator?

SENATOR BOHLKE: Senator Beutler, the only problem with those standardized tests that you mentioned is they are not criterion-based. And so...except some of them that they are now developing, some of those companies do put some criterion...they're doing a mix. And I believe Iowa Basic happens to be one of those, Terra Nova is one. But,...

SENATOR BEUTLER: Okay. So we have several hundred school districts out there, and by the way, the Class I's are going to be tested separately, right? They don't have to be a part of the affiliated...they're not a part of the affiliated group as far as their tests are concerned. They're separate, right?

SENATOR BOHLKE: That would be...that would be correct.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Okay.

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: Time.

SENATOR BEUTLER: So we have several hundred districts,.... Oh, by the way, if there are ten or fewer students,...

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: Time.

SENATOR BEUTLER: ...they're not even required to report their tests, are they?

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: Time. Senator Schimek. Senator Schimek, did you want to speak to the rule suspension or to the underlying...Senator Hartnett.
