committee that basically both of them deal with community justice. My bill says that community justice would be under the Department of Probation, which is under the judicial system. Senator Brashear's bill sets up the community justice under Corrections as a program, solidifies it and gives it basis. We both agreed that we would not do community justice this year and we would work on it extensively over the interim, in the summer, and to see where community justice really belongs. I handed out two pieces of paper. One says "Current Community Participation". that is a page out of this 11-page pamphlet of community justice under Corrections, which has spent \$200,000 today and, at this point, has not given out any money. So we have \$800,000 sitting there. Five hundred thousand dollars of that is appropriated this year that would go into this. If you look at that page, "Current Community Participation", and you look at the two-page one that I handed out, the current Office of Community Justice plans, services offered by Probation Office that are similar to those proposed by the Office of Community Justice, you will see that we have two programs that are very much alike. You take any of them programs under current community participation that was made up by the Office of Community Justice under Corrections and, except for one or two of them, Probation is already doing this and I see it as a duplication of services. We may decide, after doing a good, thorough study and working on it that we want to move Probation under Corrections; we may not. But at this point, to go ahead and authorize them to give out this \$500,000 to community-based programs, we don't...we haven't even decided if we want to get into that business, if we want to give the subsidized community-based programs with state funds. I'm asking you to support this amendment, take them three lines out and give us the time to work on it over the summer. Because, if we don't, Corrections will have that \$500,000 handed out and we still haven't got a program that's solidified in community justice. If there's any questions, I would try and answer them for you. I will talk again about the programs that Probation is currently offering and those that the Office of Community Justice want to offer that are similar to them. But right now the people that are going through the court systems are getting services and we are paying for a lot of them, and I would be glad to answer any questions you have in that line and show you how we're doing that at this point without giving more money to the programs.
