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care of all of that at this point while we're dealing with the budget bill on General File. In order to be sure that the amendment is properly drafted...oh, I thought I'd see all those cooks spoiling the broth, everybody had been working together to be sure that the elements that would go into the broth were placed in the kettle. Then it was going to be turned over to our gourmet cooks, a.k.a. fiscal members, to properly draft the amendment. It's in the pro...the broth, Senator Smith, Senator Quandahl, is in the process of preparation, and on a matter like this, it's essential that it be put together, the amendment I'm talking about, in the proper form. I had talked to as many of the members individually as I could, but for those who would have questions, those of us who support what is being done welcome those questions and among all of us I'm sure a satisfactory answer can be given. And I should serve notice on my two young freshmen senators in the front row, if we cannot give you a satisfactory answer by way of discussion and persuasion, our numbers are sufficient to drag you off the floor and keep you out of the way until we get done what needs to be done. But, since Senator Smith got his firecracker bill, I'm sure he's happy, and Senator Quandahl just kind of sits there watching everything, waiting for his opportunity to strike. I know that he, if he has any questions, will present them. But what it looks like is going to be done this session is to consider the problem of detaining juveniles, and the reason I use the term "detain", I don't want that concept of prison to be injected in the discussion that we've had thus far this session. I think it has been at a high level. I believe there are senators who may have sat back, had concerns about juvenile justice, but did not see a realistic way to have anything done, who are participating in the discussion this session. And with what seems to be a developing consensus, it is wise for us to take advantage of that momentum, and while we have money to direct it where we can see a concrete necessary result, and that's what this amendment will produce for us. And I am hoping that we can get it adopted. I don't know that there is any opposition to doing something about upgrading those facilities at Kearney and Geneva. I don't think that there is overwhelming or even substantial opposition to taking the money away from that work camp, which was placed where it is right now in a way that I'm not going to spend a lot of time discussing, but in a way that was not pleasing to members of the Legislature who were
