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heart as time goes by. However, I want to remind you that this was enacted into law and I'd like to read this part of the law to you: The Department of Correctional Services shall develop and implement an incarceration work camp to be completed no later than January 1, 2005, for adult criminal offenders to be placed in as a condition of a sentence of probation. So, in other words, if we divert these funds at this point in time, and...in the out years between now and 2005 we're going to have to come up with these funds, because it is law unless you change the law. And, again, we talk about crime going down. Well, in talking to the Corrections people out here, and I am not a corrections person, I know Dwite is very involved in that but I'm not, they say that we passed a law here about three or four years ago increasing the sentencing time and, as a result, for different offenses, as a result it did create an additional overcrowding in our penal institutions. But then I think it was last year, that was changed again. So we've changed the law back and forth and that did ease the overcrowding but we are still overcrowded. And, again, talking to the Correction people, that if we do not start this work camp and get it in operation, you're going to see that severe overcrowding again in the very near future, because this is a form of probation for those of you who can remember what we discussed two years ago. It's for these first-time offenders that would be going to prison if this facility is not available. And the main purpose of this, what sold me on it to start with, was it is a form of probation. It gets these people in...into this facility and it's rehabilitation. It's they spend six months there, and when they get out, they are still under probation and under...and under supervision for up to six months to a year. They have to take drug counseling. They have to work towards a GED, and work counseling, et cetera. So the main purpose of it is to keep those people from returning to prison because the recidivism rate hasn't been good at Kearney and these other facilities, and even in our prison system. So this is to rehabilitate people to keep them out of prison and to make them members of society who are good members of society, who will be paying taxes, supporting families, et cetera. They won't be on the dole. So there's another reason, and I agree with Senator Wehrbein. If we're going to do this, if we're going to do this, let's appropriate the money and do it because I do believe that Kearney and Geneva are in bad shape. We toured them here I
