PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Time.

SENATOR VRTISKA: ...of you are thinking, we ought to maybe think about living up to a commitment. Thank you.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. President, members of the Legislature, I'm getting fed up again. The budget is going to be my target. See, you all sit on this floor and you play with the lives of people who've gotten enmeshed in an unfair criminal justice system in the first place. You're sitting around here, talking about we're going to place this camp to satisfy some people out in McCook. The reason you do these things is because you're dealing with people who are being punished or to be rehabilitated. Not any of you are standing on this floor saying the placement in McCook is going to help the people who are being put in that facility, but you're saying the people in McCook want it. Nelson took it out there and said, this is where we're going to put it, so that's where it goes. Well, y'all can get off the boat on Senator Brown's amendment, and I get off the boat on the budget. I'm sick of it! I'm fed up with it! And I've tried to go along this session and help you all on some of the things you do. But, once again, the people who are victimized already by a racist system are going to be victimized more, and I'm supposed to sit here and listen to a bunch of white people saying, put this facility out there, because some white people out in McCook said it was promised to us and we want it. When this whole thing about that prison, which should not have been built, was being discussed and this camp, they were to be together so that one could get the benefit of the other. When the prison was moved to Tecumseh, nobody talked about putting this camp out in McCook. It was never in the plan, never. And the Legislature didn't decide that. The Department of Corrections didn't say, it's a good placement. You know who made the decision? A venal, self-serving politician. But because it benefits white people in one part of the state, all of a sudden this politician, making a blatantly political decision, binds the Legislature forever. It doesn't bind me. And I'll tell you all this, in case you got some thoughts in your head, there's nothing I have pending before this Legislature that means so much to me that I'm going to turn
