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redundant here, but it's the taxpayers' money. And commitment doesn't mean a thing to me of where we said we were going to commit to spend our money, when I need to look at where I committed to serve my constituency. The process, Senator Wickersham said, Senator Chambers said, we can change that process any time, I think Senator Wickersham on a dime we can turn because of the type of legislation we have in this state with the Unicameral. But what I'm getting to is if we know that we're throwing bad money...I mean good money after bad, and you feel that's something, then the commitment, as much as it may be, has to take a backseat. If there was a cave-in on the interstate, out here, and took out two miles, let's say an earthquake took out two miles of the interstate and the road that we had to use to get through on, we would have to move things around to get the money to fix that right away. If a school went down, one of our major prisons that we now have, OCC, NSP, LCC, one of them facilities went down, we would have to get together, special session if we weren't in session, and appropriate the money. And, if we don't have the money, we'd have to take it from somewhere else. That's what this is doing. And it's not a new issue. In the seven years that I've been in the Legislature, I have talked about facilities and how we spend money in Corrections and the places that need to be fixed up. Senator Thompson's committee has come up with this plan, and it is...something we need to do, is take care of our juveniles. If we take care of the juveniles, we'll be doing the same thing that this so-called work camp was going to do anyway. We would be preventing some of those from going into the adult system by putting them in a program where they can stay for awhile and learn something instead of having the revolving door that we now have. It will do the same thing. We need to spend some money on these young people in the programs that we have set forward before us. And this will also cut down on admissions to prison. If our prisons are overflowing,...

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: One minute.

SENATOR Dw. PEDERSEN: ...then we need to take a look at why is that happening. Maybe we need to back off from some other things. I will tell you this, we have more people in our prison system in the state of Nebraska who jam their time than we do that are paroled. That's not public safety, people, that's
