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all, the study been done. The land was there. It was...it has been purchased and the infrastructure, the sewer, the water and so on, et cetera, the education, I don't know what else it's going to address. So I guess I would oppose the amendment as I, frankly, don't know that it's going to change anything. Thank you.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Baker. Senator Engel, on the Chambers amendment.

SENATOR ENGEL: Mr. President, members of the body, I just have a couple questions. First a comment, and then a question of Senator Chambers. One thing, in delaying the process, course, with inflation, so forth, the price is going to go up. We realize that. But, secondly, I like what you said as far as leaving it up to the discretion of the...of the Director of Corrections,...

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Chambers.

SENATOR ENGEL: ...Mr. Harold Clarke, to make the decision. Now, is...if that is done, well, then they wouldn't have to wait for us. If the study is presented to the Exec Board, as you said, and the Exec Board would happen to approve it then the...then Mr. Clarke could make the decision without waiting for us to reconvene. Is that what you're saying?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: That would be my...my...oh, Mr. President, members of the Legislature, my preference would be, since we're letting the professionals do the study, let the professionals make the decision.

SENATOR ENGEL: I like that better. Yeah, I think that's the way to do it, so if that's...but I wanted to make sure I understood what you really meant in this amendment, so....

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Yeah, and one...one thing, if you don't mind me on your time,...

SENATOR ENGEL: No, that's fine. That's fine.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...what I wanted to do is get the amendment
