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SENATOR VRTISKA: No, they...

SENATOR JANSSEN: ...after it?

SENATOR VRTISKA: It's my understanding that they didn't. That's why, until the forms indicated that they were, in fact, not taxable, when they realized that, that's when they quit paying and asked for a refund. But too many years expired so the state only went back as far as the statute of limitation allowed them.

SENATOR JANSSEN: Oh.

SENATOR VRTISKA: It was somewhat the feeling if they were entitled to that much they should be entitled to all of it. And so the committee, I guess the majority of the committee, felt that they ought to, in fact, pay the balance of the money and...

SENATOR JANSSEN: Well, they did...they did get some money back...

SENATOR VRTISKA: They got \$30,000.

SENATOR JANSSEN: ...on the amount that was...still fell with under the...within the statute of limitations, is that correct?

SENATOR VRTISKA: Right.

SENATOR JANSSEN: So then they...

SENATOR VRTISKA: No, wait a minute, I'm on the wrong one. That was the...that was the Printing Company. The other, the airline company or the airplane company was the one that was asking for \$5,750 that they had overpaid in tax.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Time.

SENATOR VRTISKA: That's the one I was referring to.

SENATOR JANSSEN: Oh, all right. Thank you.
