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these type of things that did not require the collection of sales tax, but they paid the sales tax on all of the printing. When they discovered it and, as I understand it, Mrs. Mohanna was the one that was doing the books, it wasn't a professional CPA or anything like that and maybe when you're in business you should do this, but, in all due respect to her and the bookkeeping, when they discovered it they filed their claim with the State Claims Board and the part that was not passed the statute of limitations was paid. The part that was, was denied. And I agree with Senator Chambers, he's a hundred percent right; Senator Wickersham, hundred percent right as far as the statute of limitations. I don't have any problem with that. Going back to the 1992 claim that was paid, because of an overpayment of tax on gasoline, this was refunded from the Highway Trust Fund at that time and, again, as I say, 15 senators voted yes on that, are still in the body here today. In defense of the two that are on...in the body here today that did not vote, they were excused, was Senator Chambers and Senator Beutler. Every senator that is here today that was here in 1992 voted yes for the return of that overpayment of taxes. I haven't researched the statutes, I don't know. Is there a statute of limitation on how far back the state can go to claim taxes that were not paid that was owed to them? I don't have the answer to that, so if somebody here knows the answer to that maybe we could address that too. But I'm not here this morning to get into a lengthy debate on this. I just feel this was an honest mistake by some honest people and it was not the state's money. It was theirs. It was overpaid and I think it should be returned. Thank you.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Senator Chambers, on the committee amendments to LB 882.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Schmitt, Mr. President, members of the Legislature, Senator Landis can sing better than I can and he should have, instead of starting with his comment, should have broken into the song "My Heart Cries For You". We're not talking about, as Senator Landis pointed out, a heart issue here. We're talking about the revenue laws and the revenue laws are firm, unyielding, uncompromising. They are not based on compassion. They are based on sheer necessity. The state is all powerful. The state has the power and is obliged to do everything necessary to maintain the existence and viability of
