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SENATOR VRTISKA: ...I didn't, but...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...because my time is running out,...

SENATOR VRTISKA: Okay.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...based on the fact that we have this claim, suggests that whoever kept the books was not competent. Isn't that true? We can...since we're making presumptions, we could presume that, couldn't we?

SENATOR VRTISKA: I'm not going to presume anything. You can. Go ahead.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: My time is up.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Senator Chambers, your light is on next.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you, Mr. President. I will not grill Senator Vrtiska any further because he was not there, but I hope that you can get an idea of where I'm going with the questions I was asking Senator Vrtiska. Here you have a business. Over \$50,000 apparently had been paid in taxes because...I have to ask Senator Vrtiska this question so that I don't mix the two claims we're talking about. Senator Vrtiska, how much money did they recoup before being cut off by the statute of limitations?

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Senator Vrtiska.

SENATOR VRTISKA: Thirty thousand dollars.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And what they're trying to get now is an additional \$25,000.

SENATOR VRTISKA: That's correct.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: So they had paid a total of \$55,000, more or less, and is this sales tax?

SENATOR VRTISKA: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And the sales tax would probably not be more
