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anyone knows, I have a brother-in-law in that business in Iowa, not affected by this bill whatsoever, but it does allow me to have some sort of intimacy with the role of aerial application and production agriculture. And to say that, well, you can fly that crop duster to church, but you can't drive a combine to church, I'm not sure where that...that goes. I differ with my good friend, Senator Preister, on that. I don't think you do drive...or fly crop dusters to church. They can't. When you have the soil that's so permeated and soaked that you can even plant soybeans from the air with these aerial applicators, these crop dusters, so I think it is an integral part of it. I do believe that since the Legislature was to exempt items involved in production agriculture, if you want to revisit that, I think that's valid. Perhaps we should remove that exemption away from items involved in production agriculture. But this certainly is one. In fact, the Department of Revenue has now changed the forms themselves when you purchase one of these airplanes to have a notation on it that if it is used for this purpose it is tax exempt, so there's almost an admission by the Department of Revenue. I don't think that that's a bad precedent. We are fulfilling what the Legislature's intent and desire was. The other...one of the other claims we're going to have the ability to vote on is an elderly lady who was helped by Eastern Nebraska Office on Aging. They sent someone out to fill her taxes out and they made a mistake. That's a creature of the state. And I believe that my heart bleeds for that elderly woman, Senator Landis, and I'm not ashamed of that. You know, we have no problem exempting other aircraft that may, in fact, be used for enjoyment to fly out to see different sporting events or whatever in corporate Nebraska, but when you have a mom and pop aerial aviation company that are just trying to help agriculture, which is what this state is based on, we got to say "no" to them and "yes" to the..."yes" to the Leer jets and "no" to the small mom and pop aerial applicators. I...I think that that's within our scope to say "yes" to that claim and say "yes", say "yes" to that elderly woman who was helped by Eastern Nebraska Office on Aging. I don't...and I'm not ashamed of that. I think that's...that's not a present. That's compassion. That's what we have the power to do and that's what we did and I'll stick by it. I'm going to support Senator Kiel's floor amendment, I'm not going to support the motion to reconsider, and I'm going to support the rest of what the
