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Committee, where the first request that comes to you, you say, you know, that makes some sense, I think that's a good thing to fund. But the process works and you review it again and you...you begin to sleep on it, if you will, or take a chance and decide, did...did we do the right thing or not. This claim that you're asking to be reconsidered, if I was Solomon and if I had the money and somebody came up to me with a good situation and a good story that I felt sorry for, I'd give them the money. That's not the case. You're asked today to be a judge. You're asking here, here's the rule of law, the rule of law is real clear, here's the statute of limitations. You don't want judges redoing the law and making the law different to fit the individual cases, because you passed the law for a reason, because it applies to everybody the same. And if you want each of our judges in each of the districts to decide cases differently because they feel sorry for someone or they think this case is a little different and to ignore what the law is, you wouldn't stand still for that. You'd be in here complaining about judges not following the law. You're asked to be a judge today. The rule of law is very clear. The statute of limitations is not ambiguous. But what we're about to do is to try to go back and say, well, I know what the rule is, I know what the law is, but, gee, this is the right thing to do. We...we feel sorry for these people and, because we think they ought to get the money, we're going to give them the money. I don't know how many of you remember Gus Pick. Gus Pick's been in here for the last eight years on a claim. Gus Pick has just as bad, if not a worse, story and we've denied his claim, and for good reason. If you don't reconsider this, I don't know how you tell the "Gus Picks" of the world "no". There's a wide variety of these other cases that are going to come down and the reason you have a statute of limitations is at some point in time you've got to call it quits. You've got to say, I'm sorry, you can only go back so far. What about all the income tax cases that are out there? I don't know how many there are. There's hundreds of those, if not thousands of those, people who came in and come to their accountant and to their lawyer every year and say, you know, if I'd known that, I'd get some money back. And their accountant or their lawyer says, you're right but the statute of limitations is passed. If you...if you ignore a statute of limitations here, how do you in good faith turn down everybody else that will come to you? Does that mean
