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a family might see the necessity of settling, being under the various stresses that attend a lawsuit. I'm going to offer an amendment to add some money to this amount, and I'm going to see if the legislators, a sufficient number, would agree. And with that having been said, I will not take any more time, unless Senator...are there any other lights on? Because I don't want this to go away before I can offer my amendment. Thank you. I'm going to prepare an amendment.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD:      Senator Schimek, you're recognized on FA139.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Yes, thank you, Mr. President, members of the body. I don't know why I agreed to do this. Keeping us here while Senator Chambers writes an amendment, but I do think that we need to move forward on this issue, and I'm interested in seeing what his amendment is. I did remark, a while ago, Senator Chambers, when you said that thoughtful hands would go up, I didn't know hands could think, Senator. (Laugh) But anyway, I think this has been a very healthy discussion and that we definitely need to do something about this particular case. And I am probably willing to go along with what the Attorney General's Office has recommended, but I am interested to see what Senator Chambers is recommending as well. So, with that, Senator Kristensen or Senator Vrtiska, would either of you like any of my time? It may be running out, and one of you may have to punch your light on again, if you want to. With that, we could...

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD:      You have about four minutes left, Senator Schimek.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Four minutes? (Laugh) I'll never make it through, Senator. Senator Janssen would like the rest of my time.
