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these poor people are in. I can feel for the family and how they must feel, watching what happened to their son, and seeing the deterioration of that poor boy's health for four years, that would be something terrible to watch, and something that no one should have to go through. And I can understand that the claim is probably not as large as it could have been or should have been. And there is no doubt in my mind, and in anyone else's mind that these people should not...should not be compensated, especially just for the grief that they went through, not only the terrible thing that happened. I think I'm right in assuming that this happened in Gage County. Is that right? Senator Byars, could you answer a couple of questions to help kill a little time here? Senator Byars, if...

SENATOR BYARS: I would be happy to yield, Senator Janssen.

SENATOR JANSSEN: Senator Byars, where did this actually happen? It was in Gage County, and was it in Beatrice where this accident happened?

SENATOR BYARS: Yes, it was.

SENATOR JANSSEN: What type of a business or elevator was...are you familiar with the situation? What kind of an elevator was it?

SENATOR BYARS: As Senator Kristensen has described to the body, it was an elevator that was apparently of very old vintage and had been remodeled over a period of time to make it a freight type elevator, making it for use for business purposes only, hauling of freight.

SENATOR JANSSEN: And they allowed just anyone to get on that elevator? Is that the situation?

SENATOR BYARS: No, I don't think that was the case. I think at this time there was some remodeling of the building that was taking place. I wouldn't...I don't know all of the details, but I think the individual who was injured...

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: One minute.
