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must have experienced, then what the family must have experienced during those few years that the child lived after the accident. There are certain types of anguish which words cannot describe or express. And there are certain types which people who have not experienced it would never understand just from a verbal description or explanation. But we can get an inclination of what it must be by going to our own experiences and looking at those things that gave us the most grief. I don't think that seven hundred and something thousand dollars is anywhere near what ought to be offered. I would like to ask Senator Kristensen a question, since he's off the phone now.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Senator Kristensen.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Kristensen, are you aware of automobile accidents where the person injured received a greater amount than the amount being offered to this family?

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: Sure.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: So, my suggesting a greater amount is not unreasonable, on its face.

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: Well, but...I mean every case has a different set of facts. And, I mean, it's hard to compare those cases with different facts. I mean, if it was a father of five kids and he was making \$50,000 a year, you're going to have greater damages because of the loss of earning potential. So, it's hard to say car crashes bring more than this. But, yeah, obviously there are other wrongful death cases that have brought more money than this, sure there are; there are some that have brought a lot less, too.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Well, let's take one where you have a child involved, as in this case, and the other person would be in the wrong, so we don't have to argue all of that.

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: Yeah, don't argue...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And the injuries are equivalent to these, and I'm not going to say whether the...you know, how they were...
