run the city of Omaha for generations. If a commitment as large as the one that would be made to build this convention would come into being, that would be what I've described as the death knell for south Omaha and northeast Omaha. And I'm not going to allow that to happen, if I can prevent it. I know people need play time, they need playpens, but this is not a good approach to take. I don't like the fact that general obligation bonds can be issued. This thing was sold, or I should say a fast shuffle was attempted on the people of Omaha by saying how this is not going to result in a tax increase for the people in Omaha. General obligation bonds are paid off by taxes. Now if all of the money is going to be generated by this operation that they say, we don't need general obligation bonds and we don't need the state to do anything. First of all, it's going to make so much money that Omaha keeps 70 percent of this so called throwback, or throw away, or whatever they want to call it, and then 30 percent goes to the crumb snatchers, which are all these little towns around Nebraska whose representatives here, in order to get those crumbs, are to vote for LB 382. But the crumb snatchers will appeal to the Department of Economic Development, not through this board. And you cannot request less than \$20,000 in your little project, that's the minimum you can request. You cannot get more than I think it's \$150,000. So now you've got projects out there that can be funded at a level of \$150,000 from this 30 percent, Omaha has got this 70 percent, then what do you need with general obligation bonds? Let them issue revenue bonds. I'll let them do that, because that is in keeping with what they have alleged is the way this whole thing is to operate. It's going to stop people from going to Denver. I don't think people go to Denver just because they have a convention center. I don't think they go to Des Moines just because they have a convention center. They also have Worlds of Fun, or something like that, in Des Moines, and it's closer to other large population centers. People make an error, I think, in suggesting that when you build a building in Omaha it's going to bring people from everywhere. No longer do all paths lead to Rome, they all lead to Omaha, Nebraska. Somebody in New York is going to say, we were going to have a convention of the accountants of the country, and do you know I just read that Omaha has a convention center. And they say, ooo, hallelujah, let's go to Omaha, and have our convention, because they got a convention center there. These kind of arguments
