SENATOR WICKERSHAM: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And that would probably be very difficult to do, so there's not a great amount of risk...

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Time. Thank you, Senator Chambers. Discussion on the Chambers amendment to part one of the committee amendments to LB 882? Senator Bruning, followed by Lynch, Chambers, Beutler, and Raikes.

SENATOR BRUNING: Mr. President, members of the Legislature, in my mind this is a great day for the state of Nebraska, a great day for this Legislature. LB 382, I believe, is one of the finest pieces of legislation in front of us this year. One of the things I liked the most about LB 382 is the money that's coming into the state is new money. This is not like setting up a casino on our border, where we take money from our own people and circulate it, maybe send it out to the owner of a casino in Arkansas or Louisiana, this is new money. These are people that are going to come in from other states, from other cities across the country and spend their dollars in Nebraska. Only good can come from that, in my mind. This bill is supported by urban folks. This bill is supported by rural folks. The Nebraska Rural Development Commission has been a big help in the drafting of this bill. I have letters from the Omaha Chamber of Commerce in support of the bill, the city of Superior in support of the bill, urban and rural alike are in favor of this bill. Why? Why would you see rural folks in support of this bill? Well, the way the bill is designed is that 30 percent of the sales and income tax revenue generated goes into a fund that can only be used by rural communities. This bill has something for everyone. The other 70 percent will be used to pay off the convention center. This bill is supported by business and labor. I have a letter here from Terry Moore, President of the Nebraska AFL-CIO, supporting the convention center bill. And, as I said before, business supports it. Here's the Omaha Chamber of Commerce, the Nebraska Chamber of Commerce, universally supported, business and labor. The state's amount
