questions. And, Senator Lynch, it's not to ignore you, but they did put it together, and he is the one handling these. But I would like to ask Senator Wickersham a question.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Senator Wickersham.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Wickersham, on page 6, and this is not where I am, but Senator Lynch said no amendments will be accepted, but on page 6, in line 22, tell me when you get...do you see on line 22 where it says "actions of the board"?

SENATOR WICKERSHAM: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Now the language says, "actions of the board shall be by majority vote".

SENATOR WICKERSHAM: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Does that mean a majority of those voting, or a majority of all the board members?

SENATOR WICKERSHAM: That's unclear, Senator.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: But the bill cannot be amended, so we just have to leave it there and let it stand, like some other amendments that will be offered. But anyway, I just wanted to call the Legislature's attention to what happens when these deals are made. And I will call attention to these things, I will offer amendments, they can be rejected. But my intent is to take us on and on and on. Senator Bruning threatened the Revenue Committee, because he said he had 18 votes, 18 people who had signed on and 4 who were willing to say pull it out of committee. Well that's 22, it would take at least 25. But I think he should have counted to 33. I know that people from Omaha have been working this bill assiduously. And for those senators who have been contacted, they should look at the interests that those people represent. They're the people with the fat pockets and the deep pockets who would financially gain directly from legislation such as this. The fact that it's in Omaha does nothing in terms of encouraging me to support it, because I will not do that. And I think a record has to be made crystal clear about this type of proposal.
