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PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...application is speculative, wouldn't...

SENATOR WICKERSHAM: That's...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...you agree?

SENATOR WICKERSHAM: That's correct.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Yet, that is going to be the determinant of whether or not Omaha gets this state money, I meant allows this throw back thing to go into play.

SENATOR WICKERSHAM: It is the first stage in a process. You have to have an approved project and then actually construct the project, operate the project and I would say, on an annualized basis, come in and show what benefit has been derived.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And after they go through this, this board, then they've got to approve this activity.

SENATOR WICKERSHAM: They don't have to.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: I think my time is up, and I've spoken twice, have I, Mr. President?

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Correct.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Senator Chambers, you're recognized to close on your amendment.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you, Mr. President, and I will continue the discussion with Senator Wickersham, but not on my close. I will do that on my next motion. This bill is written as loosely as it is, filled with speculation and ambiguities because Omaha and the big shots want this bill. So it matters not that it's ambiguous. It matters not that nobody knows the meaning of the key word in all of this, which is "participant". Nobody knows
