SENATOR LANDIS: Right.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...50 percent of the people who actually attend would have to be from outside Nebraska.

SENATOR LANDIS: Finally, the light goes on for both of us simultaneously.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Well, that's what I thought.

SENATOR LANDIS: If this was in a comic strip, there'd be a...there'd be a light bulb over your head and a light bulb over mine, because that's what I meant for this language to mean...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And a question mark over Senator Wickersham's head.

SENATOR LANDIS: (Laugh) Perhaps.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: But see...

SENATOR LANDIS: And I think, by the way, that's what it says to me.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: But I'm not sure that's what it says. I'm...I'm moving with you, as you're describing it. I don't know why you have to put registered to attend and shown to have attended. Why do you have to show that they attended also?

SENATOR LANDIS: Yeah, what I think you want to have is you want to have a real body who showed up in Omaha, using a hotel room, buying meals, spending money for the conference, going out on the town, whatever it is that develops the new money. It's not that we want to regis...it's not that we want to reward passing papers around or dummy registration forms. Real income means somebody showed up and bought something while they were here.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Now let's get to the way I view some promoters. What would prevent a promoter from having people, who are not from outside of Nebraska, sign a registration form and say, Joe Smith, Council Bluffs, Iowa, and that person lives
