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go to the show and see a movie because, Senator Smith, they probably don't have the kind of movies out there in Gering that they have in Omaha. And she would tell you, when is this trip planned? And he'd say, well, I'm thinking we can get a flight out of here if we make our connections in Grand Island, around 8:00 p.m. And she'd say, when will we touch down in Omaha? He'd say, well, whenever they, you know, they make it there. And she'd say, well, I think that I'm going to have a headache. And that's how people would feel about Omaha. There are people who buy homes in other locations because they don't want to stay in Omaha even though they live there. How many...let me ask Senator Byars a question.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Senator Byars, would you yield?

SENATOR BYARS: Certainly.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Byars, and I'm not going to challenge you if you answer in the affirmative, do you know of any...

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...CEO whose main house and place of business is in another state who bought a winter home in Omaha or a summer home in Omaha?

SENATOR BYARS: No.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you. I don't either. So what is there that's going to draw Omaha when you put this building there? This shows, I think, the parochial nature of Nebraskans and those in this Legislature. Maybe most people will swallow the story that has been given, but I won't.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Discussion on the Chambers amendment, Senator Hudkins.

SENATOR HUDKINS: Senator Chambers, I couldn't let this...thank you, Mr. President and members. Senator Chambers, I couldn't let this pass. You said, why would anybody come to Omaha? A few years back my husband and I were involved in an organization where we, along with about 15 or so others, were committee
