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check-in when people arrive. I'd give them their packet, that's pretty normal. You check into a convention, they know who's there. You've given them their name badge and their packet and they're...at that point you have a registration form and you have somebody who's showed up and picked it up.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Now...

SENATOR LANDIS: Right.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: If somebody doesn't want to sign in...

SENATOR LANDIS: Uh-huh.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...they can still attend, can't they, but they just couldn't be counted.

SENATOR LANDIS: Yeah, I've been to a...I know, for example, I walked through a hotel...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Uh-huh.

SENATOR LANDIS: ...and somebody is giving a speech and it was part of a conference and I looked around, and didn't have a name badge. Nobody's at the door and I walked in and sat down and listened. If I can do that, I bet somebody else can do that.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Would these people that you say are on the site be allowed to eyeball and...no, they couldn't because under this language, the persons must register. If they're not registered, they can't count...

SENATOR LANDIS: They don't count but...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...toward determining the nature of the event.

SENATOR LANDIS: That's right. Exactly. Two things have to occur, in my estimation, and I know we have colloquy about that. First, registration followed by attendance.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay.
