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added language that says the lien follows the crops as proceeds into, if you will, livestock being fed for that purpose. It does not extend so far as a third-party sale, which is a cash sale under the code, but the converter, rancher in this case, would have the proceeds move from the growing crops into the feeding of their own livestock. There is a set of provisions in this amendment that comes from another bill. It's LB 827 introduced by Senator Bromm, and so you'll see, I believe, Senator Bromm's name has been added to this bill. And the reason is LB 827 has to do with real property statutory liens, whether they're state or federal in nature. These are tax liens against real property. In 1998, we passed 1321, that created the centralized filing system, and we moved these real property tax liens into that centralized filing system. The land title folks said, no, these are, because they're real property, the register of deeds is the location where this particular work should be done. After meeting and conferring with them and then harmonizing those changes with this bill, we thought, rather than doing LB 827 at a different time, we should incorporate it so that its enforcement dates and its effective dates could be harmonized with this bill. What we're saying then in these amendments are that real property statutory liens will be presented to the Secretary of State, put into our statewide system, but then downloaded to the register of deeds and the register of deeds will file at their state...at their county offices. What this means is that the traditional rule will be followed. Liens upon real property for statutory tax purposes will be filed at the register of deeds and available at that location for identification for land title purposes. It will, however, have been presented to the Secretary of State and have been built into our statewide system, and that will increase the availability of information to everyone, so I think a win-win for the whole area. The last piece is that we had to file this to make sure that our enforcement and effective dates were appropriately done. We filed on April 23rd, at the request of the Revisor of Statutes, to replace a previous amendment which we passed over, because that was filed on a different day and the version was...the difference of the version was an enforcement mechanism and date of enforcement that would permit us to harmonize LB 165 from Senator Hilgert, which we passed earlier, which became effective on February 18, 1999. Now we want to make sure all these changes are done at the same time.
