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analysis of the language and intent of the applicable regulation, it appears that Nebraska's site suitability requirements would not be violated if US Ecology's disposal facility were to be located as proposed." Nebraska's own legal counsel told them there is no violation of anything, if this site that US Ecology selected is the one. Nebraska chose to ignore what its counsel told it. So, Senator Wehrbein doesn't have to worry about what we say on this floor. He needs to worry about the fact that there is an official legal opinion from Nebraska's own hired counsel, which Nebraska chose to ignore. The fact that money extorted from these generators was used, not for the purposes required under the law, but to pay the salary of people resisting this effort. The fact that the state decided they were going to make certain allegations and raise issues with US Ecology, then shut the door and say they will not accept anymore information or responses from US Ecology, we're not going to accept it, and it goes on and on and on. And, if that is what constitutes good faith, I wonder if that would be the feeling were Louisiana or one of the other states adopting the exact posture of Nebraska and Nebraska had kicked in money, and then would be faced with what Nebraska is putting in the face of these others? Senator Beutler, what makes...what Nebraska has done so bad is that during this process Nebraska wasn't just being neutral, Nebraska was continuing to extort millions of dollars. And, as Judge Kopf pointed out, the vast majority of that money went to the state of Nebraska. They were continuing to profit from the delay that they were causing. They would make agreements that such and such would be done by a certain day, then they would change their mind and say, well we're not going to do it by then. There are memos, e-mails, and other documents which demonstrate the bad faith, the intentional, calculated bad faith of this state. When you're beyond the realm of negligence or even recklessness and reach the point of bad faith, you're talking about intentional misconduct. And once you can show bad faith, a court can step in and will do much more in the way of granting a remedy and assessing damages than would be the case if bad faith were not found. And the thing so bad about it is that it extends over a period of years. What Judge Kopf wrote is that it took Nebraska eight years to say no, during all of which time they're extorting this money and rolling in dough and mispending it. One of the true culprits, and I'm going to talk
