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questions. I'm not going to try to change any of those things because the geniuses have spoken. But what I was going to point out if I were the one drafting this legislation, I would not put these findings in because they're going to have to change the findings to reflect what is in the bill. However, I don't think that they will do that because they are too proud, they're too stiff-necked, they are too arrogant, they feel they have things their way, and what does it matter if Nebraska enacts another badly drafted piece of legislation? Well, it matters to me. But what I'm dealing with now is this first segment of the findings. Why wouldn't it be sufficient to say, if you're going to put this in, the Legislature finds that it is essential, I don't think that's true, but anyway to give them as much as possible, the Legislature finds that it is essential to the economic well-being of the people of this state that there be in this state convention and meeting center facilities of appropriate size and quality to host regional, national, or international events, period? That would be sufficient to say what is intended. But again, the idea is to use smoke and mirrors to hoodwink the public and make it appear this convention center is something it's not, giving the impression that it's going to advance the cause of education. This is not an educational facility. This is a convention center. I would like to ask Senator Landis, well, I see Senator Coordsen over there. Senator Coordsen, I would like to ask you a question.

SENATOR CUDABACK PRESIDING

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Coordsen, would you yield?

SENATOR COORDSEN: I've got an answer but it probably won't fit.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: It might. Senator Coordsen, when the discussion was underway relative to this convention and meeting center, was there any discussion of the types of...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...conventions that would come?

SENATOR COORDSEN: There was quite a lot of discussion about the types of convention that would come.
