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although I thought I did, I don't.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you. I would like to ask Senator Landis the same question if he knows; and if you don't, you don't even have to speculate.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Do you yield, Senator Landis?

SENATOR LANDIS: I do not know. I think this is green copy language generally.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Oh.

SENATOR LANDIS: I think this came from the introduction of the bill and I bet that's where you're going to find it.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you, Senator Landis. Along the way on some of these issues, I think I'm going to find out what actually was a part of the deal that was brokered to get these amendments out here and what may have been a part of the green bill which was atrocious. And quite frankly, that's the one that I was hoping would be advanced by the Revenue Committee. Oh, I could have done some instructing. On occasion, my good friend, Senator Matzke, has referred to me as a law school professor because of the scholarly way in which I'll discuss certain issues. I would have been a college professor on that green copy, but not just a college professor. I would have been, had a bit of the butcher and the meat cutter. Some people don't know the difference, Senator "Cap" Dierks, but there is quite a bit of difference between a butcher and a meat cutter. I found that out from experience, not by having each one apply his trade on me. But I had referred to a meat cutter as a butcher. A meat cutter is not a knife person who uses a knife in the street to cut meat. But anyway, I would have cut that thing to ribbons. What we have here is not much better. This amendment, if I were voting for it, for the bill, I would support the amendment. However, I hope that the members follow Senator Landis' lead and will vote against every amendment that I offer and leave the deal as it is even if the Revenue Committee did not fashion the language which we have here. Deals are constructed by having differing groups or individuals come together and negotiate. Each gives up something. Or one
