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is ambiguity, as there is in this bill, if there are inconsistencies and contradictions, as there are in this bill, the court may strike the whole thing down or it may try to do a job of reconciling things where possible and save the bill if it can. One area that the court might think the Legislature paid attention to, if it paid attention to nothing else, is what the Legislature itself asserted were its reasons for doing what it did. If the Legislature asserts that the intention was to limit this thing to educational, for instruction and education of the participants, that could be it. I don't believe Senator Landis can show me anywhere else in the bill where it talks about the types of conventions that are to be there other than they mention, not road shows but trade shows and a couple of other things, but they have to be for the purpose of instruction and education. I wonder how many trade shows they're going to have at the convention center? Remember, this is not an arena. I would like to ask Senator Landis a question, if he knows the answer.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Landis, would you respond?

SENATOR LANDIS: I'll do my best.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Landis, is this building supposed to be like an auditorium with seats or is there to be a large open area which can accommodate trade shows and such things as that, if you know?

SENATOR LANDIS: I don't know. I'm not privy to a blueprint. I will tell you what the picture is in my head,...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay.

SENATOR LANDIS: . .if it has any value to you. I've been in convention centers in the past and I'm sure you have, too. You're a well-traveled man who has gone to a lot of things. You'll oftentimes see a centralized auditorium for a full plenary session. You'll have meeting rooms and breakout rooms and there's oftentimes a way to accommodate meals in a building like this. And it's not uncommon to have a floor of the building that is generally open, that vendors bring examples of their wares, set up booths, and people who go to the convention
