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discussions we have had, and by we I include Senator Wickersham, the other day, on just what a participant is. Do you think a person reading this, without the benefit of those discussions, could get the impression that the additional state and local tax collections that will underwrite this project will come from persons residing outside the state, since that's what this language says is the design?

SENATOR LANDIS: And only from people outside the state,...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Yes.

SENATOR LANDIS: ...Senator Chambers? Ah...they...it's possible they might come to that conclusion, Senator Chambers. I think if they read the whole bill they would come to a different conclusion. But it's possible that they might look at that and see that.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Let me read the next sentence and see if you think this sentence adds to the belief that it applies to people from without the state, or those inside, too. Reading in line 15, on page 1, "This new economic activity can reduce tax burdens of state residents while creating new economic opportunities for residents." By reducing tax burdens of state residents, doesn't that tie into the sentence just preceding it that gives the impression that the tax collections will come from persons outside of the state?

SENATOR LANDIS: I think we're looking at the shading of a meaning, but, Senator Chambers, I would grant that that's a possibility. I wouldn't say it's a certainty. We're looking now about impressions that people might get. They don't fall into hard science, but I would certainly grant the possibility of that conclusion being drawn. I think there are also other conclusion that could be drawn that compete with that, but I would certainly acknowledge that that's one of them.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Landis, suppose the language, in lines 12 through 17, were excised from the bill. How would that harm the bill, and what necessary information would be denied the public, if that language were excised?
