SENATOR LANDIS: Help me out, do that again, I didn't understand that one.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay. Let me ask, because we only have a minute,...

SENATOR LANDIS: Okay.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...I better rephrase the question to make it clear. (Laugh)

SENATOR DIERKS: Thank you, Senator Chambers, you're next.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you, Mr. President. Senator Landis, let me try to give an example...

SENATOR LANDIS: Okay.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...so that it's clear.

SENATOR LANDIS: Good.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Let us not talk about what you might pay going to the convention, but this extra spending, because that's kind of where you focused on these other types of taxes. If a person goes to a hotel, is the entire amount of that person's hotel bill going to be taken to be attributable revenue, or when the hotel room tax...

SENATOR LANDIS: Gotcha.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...is imposed,..okay.

SENATOR LANDIS: Thank you, I think I understand now. Let's imagine a \$150 hotel bill, let's imagine a \$15 hotel bill tax, and let's imagine a \$6 sales tax.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay.
