SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Raikes, do you hold...what's the highest academic degree you hold?

SENATOR RAIKES: Ah...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: A doctorate?

SENATOR RAIKES: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: See, I know things that you have to speculate about or pause.

SENATOR RAIKES: That's true, I'm...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: I've studied you.

SENATOR RAIKES: ...I'm continually amazed by that, Senator. (Laughter)

SENATOR CHAMBERS: In the process (laugh), in the process of getting that degree you took some undergraduate courses in English, is that true?

SENATOR RAIKES: Yes, I did,...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Are you with me in locating...

SENATOR RAIKES: ...some successfully.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Oh, all of them, I suspect. You enjoyed high success. This man is so modest, he changes the definition of the word. Modest is a word that applies to everything else that that word embraces, then there's a second word that would carry the term "Raikes", and it's an even higher level of what we ordinary mortals deem to be modesty. Senator "Modesty", Senator Raikes, when we talk about language dealing with this board, on page 1, I want to ask you about the language dealing with the economics professor. And I'll help you locate it. Starting in line 15 on page 2 is where it would be. Have you located it?
