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this mechanism. Thank you.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Thank you, Senator Landis. To close on FA142, Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. President, members of the Legislature, Senator Landis is smooth, very smooth. And when somebody is that smooth, you know there is something wrong with what he is saying. (Laugh) It's like the guy who holds up the bottle of elixir and tells you all these wonderful things that it's going to do, but it hasn't done it for him. Now, most people will not look beyond or behind the words. What Senator Landis said can all be taken to be plausible, but he can't get away from what the language says. And let me explain something to Senator Landis, because I had to bring a bill to correct a situation, it had to do with the state colleges or community colleges, and it had to do with transacting business, and all it said was "a majority vote", and nobody knew what that meant. And it took legislation, because they asked me to bring it, to establish what that referred to. So Senator Landis, who brokered this deal, is obviously going to say everything in is clear to him, (laugh) and it's clear to me, too, it's clearly wrong. We have bill after bill that tells us what constitutes a quorum. We even have a statement of what constitutes a quorum of the Legislature. But all of a sudden, on this bad bill, Senator Landis says, when it says "majority vote", it's clear to him what it means. I wonder if it's clear to him what it means...Senator Landis, may I ask you a question?

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Senator Landis, would you yield?

SENATOR LANDIS: Well, let's hear the question. (Laugh)

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Landis, Senator Landis, since you know the area, I won't keep making a reference to...

SENATOR LANDIS: Yeah.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...the page and the line number. But what constitutes a quorum of this board?
