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SENATOR COORDSEN: I'm...Senator Chambers, I'm going to think I need to go to your optometrist because your eyes are sharper than mine, because those are...by the use of the words, they make a...create a completely different picture. Let me read back to the intent, they're different in that the first, beginning on line 6, is for a political subdivision...

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: One minute.

SENATOR COORDSEN: ...whatever, that has done these things in the past. And then the second situation, which I believe is a separate situation, begins on line 7, "or has approved", and then the general obligation bonds may be issued to do all three of those things at the same time, to acquire, construct, and operate eligible facilities.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: But you agree there is a difference there, whatever it may...whatever...

SENATOR COORDSEN: There is a difference but there is also a difference, I believe, in intent...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay.

SENATOR COORDSEN: ...on those two...two phrases.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And, Mr. Chairman, I've spoken ten minutes? Okay, thank you.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Thank you, Senator Chambers. (Visitors introduced.) On the motion to reconsider, Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you. Mr. President, members of the Legislature, there is another item that I'm mighty tempted to bring up at this point, but I may have to ask questions of Senator Landis, Senator Coordsen and Senator Raikes, so I will fight off that temptation because I don't want Senator Landis to be left out in the cold or for him to have to go against his standard operating procedure on reconsideration motions. But what I do want to point out is that the city auditorium lost over \$1 million last year. These operations do not make money. I don't know who here knows anything about the Orpheum. Let me
