see if Senator Jensen knows anything about that. I would like to ask Senator Jensen a question, if he would yield.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Senator Jensen, would you yield?

SENATOR JENSEN: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Jensen, the Orpheum is used for various types of cultural, social, educational and other events and activities. Are you aware of that?

SENATOR JENSEN: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Do you have any idea whether the Orpheum operates at a profit?

SENATOR JENSEN: No, I do not, Senator Chambers. I know the Orpheum, the Rosenblatt Stadium and the auditorium convention center that we presently have I think usually are reported as one, I believe, but I'm not sure, Senator.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay, and I'm not either but because Council President Brown has pointed out that the auditorium had lost a million dollars, I was wondering if anybody was aware of the Orpheum? It seems like I had heard it indicated while all this was being discussed that not the Orpheum, not the auditorium or any other operation operates at a profit. But let me ask you, do you know about Rosenblatt Stadium; does that operate at a profit or is it subsidized by tax money?

SENATOR JENSEN: I'm not sure whether it is or not. I know certainly the College World Series pays for its own. I think there's kind of a deal that was maybe below market for the Omaha Royals, which is not the Omaha Golden Spikes, I guess it's called.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Well, if it's below market, does that mean there's an amount that has to be made up somehow?

SENATOR JENSEN: Probably so.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Would that be a tax subsidy probably?
