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something like that to be counted.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And, Senator Coordsen, if you know, was there any consideration given to whether these out-of-town participants should have to pay at the convention they attend in order for that convention to qualify as an event which can produce this attributable revenue?

SENATOR COORDSEN: If, by that question, you mean are they regis...they have to be a registered convention participant to be counted.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: But there doesn't have to...it doesn't have to be a convention where a fee is charged to participate?

SENATOR COORDSEN: I don't know that we spoke about that exactly because there...I don't know unless...I'm trying to consider in my own mind a situation where there could be a convention without a registration fee that would provide you with any sort of information that would allow the creation of the economic data to do the rebate from.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Well, that's my feeling, but in talking to Senator Landis, I think I got a different impression, that the participants need not have to pay. And if that is true, it makes it even more speculative than I had been accusing it of being, the process...

SENATOR COORDSEN: Well, I don't think it's true...I don't think it's either true or not true. I don't think that's something that the Revenue Committee, to the best of my recollection, didn't consider would be any convention that was put on without any registration fee connected with it.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: They did or did not?

SENATOR COORDSEN: I said we did not consider that there would be a convention that did not carry with it a registration fee or some means of verifying the number of attendees because that's part of the...part of the mechanism for determining what the multiplier applies to, you have to have a number of people.
