SENATOR CHAMBERS: Let...

SENATOR COORDSEN: And the number of people have to be the registered attendees.

SENATOR COORDSEN: Well, I've never been to one of Reverend Graham's events. I do not know whether you have to register to attend or whether you simply walk in. It...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Well, let's say you register but you don't pay.

SENATOR COORDSEN: That is something that I simply have not participated in any discussion to the extent that I can give you a definitive answer.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you, Senator Coordsen.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Senator Chambers, you're recognized to close on your motion to reconsider.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. President, members of the Legislature, the more that this matter is discussed, even though the participants are limited in number, the vaguer it becomes and I think the more questions are generated. When you're starting out on a proposal such as this, which is not known to Nebraska law, and which is not really designed to benefit the populace at large, when no matter how the bacon is cut, there's not going to be some to go around to everybody in the state, it's difficult to put together a scheme that doesn't have a lot of holes and shortcomings.
