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attend. I want somebody at some point to show for the record a meaningful way to determine the number of people from out of state who will attend any one of these conferences, whether you pay or not. Some people have been indicted for falsifying names and addresses on petitions which were designed to put something on the ballot for a vote of the people. Not all of the fraudulent signatures were discovered based on some of those who did a check of how that situation was looked at. It was not always possible to determine who had put a fraudulent signature and address on a petition, but it was not difficult to establish that it was fraudulent because the person might be dead, not living in Omaha, or a completely fictitious individual. Where money is an incentive, things will be done which ordinarily wouldn't be, because without the incentive, there's no reason to do them. The city, to my way of thinking, would do all that it could in dealing with any person who was going to put on a convention to persuade those people to indicate, and they may tell the people something like this, we want you to indicate how many or what percentage of the participants are from outside of Nebraska. So you're allowed to make an estimate, and if you estimate more than 50 percent or at least 50 percent will be from out of state, that works to the benefit of both of us because when you're going to have 50 percent or more from out of state, we'll give you a discount. And then we're able to make that up by providing that information to the state and the state will kick some money back to us. I'm just not trustful of these activities. I'm even looking at the way that all those law enforcement people had the gall to call a press conference and say that that money they get from drug confiscations should not go to the schools, despite what the constitution said. Now I thought, well, I know every law enforcement officer takes an oath to uphold the constitution and laws, except in this instance. We were told by a lot of people during the Clinton proceedings that no person is above the law...

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...except law enforcement people. Either the constitution is to be obeyed or it isn't, either an oath means something or it doesn't, either law enforcement people are above the law or they are not, but people have a way when money is involved of seeing that the notion that the end justifies the
