about would only come into play if they take the place of the original issue but they are at a lower interest rate.

SENATOR COORDSEN: That is my understand, yes, Senator.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay, that clears that up for me because I'm going to get off into that later on. But that caught my attention at this point. Thank you, Senator Coordsen.

SENATOR COORDSEN: Well, I'm privileged to have been asked the question.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And I want to tell you how much I appreciate your intelligence in asking George to help us both out, the other George. (Laugh) Members of the Legislature, this is a reconsideration motion but the issue in that motion is not consequential. That would have been where we used the letters (a), (b), (c), and (d) to designate specific portions of the findings provision of this law. Now Senator Landis earlier said that we're discussing substantive issues in the bill while dealing ostensibly with relatively inconsequential amendments that I've offered. And he would have preferred that these substantive issues be the subject of the amendments. Why would I not do that?

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Because had I done that in the beginning, they would have all been rejected just like these are being rejected too. I've tried that in the past on bills like this that were greased, that were the subject of a deal, and we're told in advance that there can be no amendments made to the bill. So I have a memory of how these things have happened in the past. So I decided the approach that I would take is to show how flawed this bill is, how many contradictions, inconsistencies, and open questions there are in this bill. But those supporting it will take it just like it is because they just want a bill with this number to pass the Legislature. The bill, to my way of thinking, is not really the main thing that those in Omaha are pushing for. This is their cover.
