when we began to discuss this bill that there would be no amendments, I didn't expect anybody to stand up and say, oh, but there can be, and nobody did that until I began to show all these inconsistencies, these places where the definition was not carried through throughout the bill when you're talking about the eligible facility. Then others started paying attention and say, hey, something is wrong with this bill. Some things are wrong with this bill and, in fact, lists are being kept of the things wrong with this bill. So I would advise you-all to follow what Senator Landis is telling you. This Legislature is the ship of state. Even though it may bear the name, the Caine, I don't intend to start a mutiny. I'm going to let you keep the captain you've got and let the captain take you and the ship right onto the rocks. I'm not the navigator of this ship. I'm not manning the wheel, you got other people doing that. They've convinced you that every thing is all right here. There are just some minor things, maybe some tinkering needs to be done here, tinkering needs to be done there, and it's not important that you tell the world that your official policy in this state is that before you can have progress in your educational system in this state, you got to have a convention center built in Omaha. To me that's significant. That's the thing of jokes about this state like the other kind of jokes that are made about this state. Jokes don't mean that what the joke says is necessarily true, but you find states getting very touchy about those jokes that cast their states as being ignorant, stupid, lacking in sophistication and class. I have not even seen where the state of Mississippi, which is probably the most backward state in the country, has ever said that you will achieve educational progress by building a convention center. As dumb as they are in Mississippi, they probably would have realized that when you're talking about improving education, you need school buildings, not convention centers. Then you need competent teachers and administrators. You need a curriculum that has body, meaning, and depth to it, but not convention centers. But leave it to Nebraska, number one in football, number nothing in every thing else, to say the essential of educational progress in this state is a convention center built in Omaha. Senator Landis says we're sputtering about these issues. No, Senator Landis, I'm not sputtering. I am fulminating,...
